Targeted Intervention Programme for HIV/AIDS Prevention in Tiruchirapalli District April 2023 to March 2024

PDI has been implementing a Targeted Intervention Program in selected blocks of Tiruchirapalli District since October 2009, with support from the Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society (TANSACS), Chennai. This programme is focused on seven blocks, including Uppiliyapuram, Thuraiyur, Thottiyam, Thathaiyangarpettai, Musiri, Mannachanallur, and Pullambadi.

The primary objective of this program is to educate and promote safe sex practices among the core group population, which includes Female Sex Workers and MSMs/Transgender individuals. Additionally, the programme aims to encourage these individuals to seek treatment for STIs and test for HIV, in government hospitals. Another key goal is to enhance the quality of life for the core group population, thereby reducing their risk of HIV infection. The project focuses on both disease prevention and improving the well-being of the target group.

The project team consists of one project manager, one counselor, one Accountant Cum Monitoring Evaluation Assistant, seven outreach workers, and fifteen peer educators. This program targets approximately 793 male sex workers, 1448 female sex workers, and a significant number of transgender individuals.

Peer educators are the backbone of this project, acting as change agents for their communities. They work directly with key populations, particularly female sex

workers, MSMs (Men who have Sex with Men), and transgender individuals, to encourage safer sexual practices and reduce HIV/AIDS risk.

Peer Education

These peer educators are chosen by their peers themselves, with guidance from the project staff. This ensures trust and facilitates open communication. Their role is crucial in outreach activities, connecting with individuals within the target groups. To ensure effectiveness, the project team conducts regular review meetings at the block level, drop-in center level, and project level. These meetings serve two key purposes:

- O Review and Feedback: They provide a platform to review peer educator activities, identify areas for improvement, and offer motivation for continued progress.
- O Capacity Building: Peer educators receive training on micro-level planning, allowing them to tailor their outreach efforts to specific needs.

These review meetings have a significant impact on the program. They help identify gaps in services, understand risk behaviors within the target groups, and inform future outreach strategies. In the period from April 2023 to March 2024, the program actively engaged fifteen peer-educators. These individuals participated in 22 review meetings held weekly at the project office and block levels.

Recognizing the need to reach a broader audience, the project team uses popular mobile applications to identify new unreached High Risk Group populations. This resulted in a significant increase in programme reach. Peer educators were able to successfully identify and recruit 51 individuals engaging in same-sex relationships/ GAYS. Additionally, through the use of these new tools, the program registered a total of 417 individuals, including those in high-risk situations such as frequently

using rented accommodation, brothels, and those in contact with brokers. In total, during the reporting period, 468 individuals got registered with the project.

All project services are delivered directly to the target population with the support of these peer educators. Currently, the project has 15 peer educators: 10 Female Sex Workers (FSW), 4 Men who have Sex with Men (MSM), and 1 Transgender (TG) individual. Notably, all of these peer educators underwent a three-day intensive HIV/AIDS training conducted by Kshamta Kendra from February 5th to 7th, 2024, organized by the Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society at Femina Hotel Tiruchirapalli. They also participate in monthly meetings to share their experiences and receive ongoing support.

Interpersonal and Group Communication Sessions

To foster positive behavior change, peer educators and field workers engage with individuals and groups within the target population. These interactions involve:

- Providing HIV/AIDS information: Sharing essential knowledge about HIV/AIDS, its transmission, and prevention.
- O Condom distribution and education: Distributing condoms and providing guidance on proper use and addressing barriers to condom use. The staff and the peer educators demonstrate the correct condom usage and motivate the community members to redemonstrate the correct usage.
- Promoting testing and treatment: Informing individuals about available testing and treatment services at government hospitals.

During the reporting period, the program facilitated 2,120 interpersonal communication sessions, providing direct support and information to individuals within the target population. In addition, 71 group meetings were organized to address service delivery challenges collectively. These meetings empowered the target population to work together and find solutions, ultimately improving program effectiveness. Besides, the 27 Drop-in Centre level meetings and 70 Demand Generation Meetings have also been facilitated to make the programme to reach more individual HRGs.

Counseling and Support Services

The project provides counseling and support services depending upon the needs of the target population it offers a comprehensive programme. The project counselor meets with

individuals at high risk of HIV/STI/VDRL infection, those facing challenges with treatment access, newly diagnosed individuals, those seeking behavioral change support, and partners of people living with HIV. The counselor assesses their physical and mental health, provides counseling, and refers them to appropriate resources. The counseling session's emphasis on focus on treatment adherence, viral load testing, treatment guidelines for new diagnoses, nutritional advice, and the importance of partner testing and treatment. The 2023-2024 counseling programme provided 606 BCC counseling sessions, 22 STI-related counseling sessions, 91 psychological counseling sessions, 171 positive prevention counseling sessions, and 243 pre/posttest counseling sessions.

Referral Services for STI/HIV/Tuberculosis

The Project Team actively encourages all members of the target population to undergo HIV testing. Each block has an integrated counseling and testing center (ICTC) at the primary health center, and our team has built strong relationships with the ICTC staff. To track the health of the target population, new individuals receive comprehensive testing, including presumptive treatment. Regular testing is also conducted for those already registered: HIV/VDRL tests every six months, STI tests every three months, tuberculosis tests as needed, and cervical cancer and hepatitis B tests annually. All these tests are provided free of charge at local government hospitals and primary health centers. Individuals diagnosed with any infection receive full treatment at these facilities.

To address the health needs of the entire community, our project prioritizes testing and support for the partners of individuals living with HIV. Every six months, we conduct HIV/VDRL tests on husbands, live-in partners, children, and sexual partners of our target population. Those diagnosed with HIV or other sexually transmitted infections receive comprehensive treatment and ongoing counseling to manage their health and reduce the risk of transmission.

Condom Promotion and Accessibility

The project encourages safe sex practices among the target population, with the prioritization consistent and correct condom use. Peer educators and field workers insist the message with individual that belongs to HRG population. The conducts project comprehensive condom demand analysis in key areas every three months.Based on this

analysis, free condoms provided by the Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society are distributed directly and mostly through the peer educators to the target population, ensuring sufficient supply. Social marketing of condoms also plays crucial role in condom promotion to inculcate the habit of purchasing priced condoms from the local shops as a sustainable plan to increase the accessibility to condoms by the community. The staff team persuaded many local petty shop owners located nearer to the hotspots to sell priced condoms. These shops offer condoms at affordable prices, making safe sex practices more readily available.

In one year period from April 2023 to March 2024, the total free condom demand across the seven blocks was 672,534, while the distribution reached 335,437, leaving a gap of 337,097. Despite 41 outlets selling priced condoms, total sales amounted to Rs 6,550/-

Advocacy Initiatives

To better understand and address the needs of the target population, we conducted community engagement meetings. These gatherings brought together community members, stakeholders, and project staff to discuss challenges, share information, and develop solutions.

On June 15th and 17th, 2023, meetings in Musiri and Manachanallur focused on identifying new target individuals and conducting HIV testing. A separate community

engagement meeting was held with secondary target groups, such as brokers, auto drivers, and Jamaath leaders, to increase awareness and support. A total of 19 secondary target individuals attended the meetings.

On September 29th, 2023,a meeting at the Manachanallur Union Office involved social welfare extension officers, women's welfare officers, and community members to discuss barriers to accessing social welfare programs and provide training on relevant government schemes. A total of 29 community members attended the meetings.

On March 9th, 2024, a legal awareness workshop was conducted at the project office in No. 1 Toll Gate, providing training on the basic rights of the target population to approximately twenty-five individuals. This has been facilitated by Advocate Ms. Jayanthi Mala in association with District Legal Aid Authorities.

With the objective strengthening community engagement and address specific needs, the project has been implementing several initiatives. These include regular community events for gatherings specialized committees focused on sexually transmitted infections (STIs), condom use, domestic violence, disclosure, and information, and consent (DIC).

A community event was held on September 23, 2023, at the Thottiyam Union Office meeting hall. Special guests included Dr. Vinoth, Medical Officer at Thottiyam Government Hospital, and Ms Pushpam, Counselor at Musiri Government Hospital, along with tuberculosis program staff and mobile medical unit staff. A total of 113 target individuals and community development workers attended the event. At the end of the event, HIV/VDRL/TB tests were conducted.

MsAarthi, a Community Leader of transgender and peer educator from Manachanallur Block, organized a community event on March 12, 2024, specifically for the LGBTQ+ community. Approximately 134 individuals attended, with 54 undergoing comprehensive medical check-ups, including HIV and VDRL testing, provided by healthcare professionals from Manachanallur Government Hospital.

To support economic empowerment, the project conducted a one-day beauty business training session on July 21, 2023, for approximately 25 interested individuals. The training covered essential steps and tasks for starting a beauty business.

Additionally, on November 1, 2023, we recommended 12 transgender individuals and target women for a beauty training program offered by the Indian Overseas Bank. These individuals have successfully completed the training and are now equipped with new skills to pursue entrepreneurial opportunities.

World AIDS Day 2023

PDI Commemorates World AIDS Day in Thuraiyur

On December 1st, 2023, PDI organized a meeting at the Thuraiyur Union Office to mark World AIDS Day. The event brought together a diverse group of stakeholders, including local officials, government representatives, project staff, PLHIVs (people living with HIV), and community members.

Participants discussed HIV/AIDS awareness, prevention, and the importance of combating stigma and discrimination. Ms Selvarani, Chairperson of the Thuraiyur Municipality, presided over the event. Transgender activist Ms.Lavanya led the oath-taking ceremony, and Mr.Sethuraman, Counselor at the Integrated Counseling and Testing Center in Thuraiyur, also participated. Approximately one hundred transgender and marginalized women attended the event. Dr. I. Ambalavanan, Director of PDI, commended the staff team for their efforts in reaching out to underserved populations, including the LGBTQ+ community. Mr A. Muthukumar coordinated the World AIDS Day events.

Evaluation

Every two years, an external evaluation is conducted to assess the effectiveness of the programs implemented with the support of the Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society (TANSACS). This evaluation involves a team of external experts who conduct a thorough assessment of the programme's implementation.

The most recent evaluation was carried out on February 27, 28, and 29, 2024, at PDI TI Project office. Mr Dominic Edwin, the lead evaluator, and Mr Hemachandran, the Co-evaluator, conducted the evaluation. They interacted with the target population in the program's implementation areas to gather feedback on the program, the benefits they have received, and the overall program implementation. Additionally, they assessed the functioning of treatment centers, the performance of peer educators, field workers, and financial transactions through both direct and indirect methods. A comprehensive report was prepared

based on the findings and submitted to TANSACS. An auditor also visited the office on the third day of the evaluation, to evaluate the financial performance of the project.

Nutritional Support Program for children Infected with and Affected by HIV Tiruchirapalli District

PDI is a registered nonprofit organization with Benevity, a global leader in online work place, giving, and matching and volunteering and integrated grand management solutions. PDI receives donation from different philanthropists as part of their work place giving. PDI has received support to guide the children affected and infected by HIV/AIDS. A few of individual donors had contributed their donations to PDI through Benevity. With their support, PDI facilitates support group meeting to the children with their parents at the office. The support group meeting for the children affected and infected by HIV are being organized at office in which the children along with their parents or guardians participate. In general, the children will get nutritional kit which includes, green gram, Chenna, dates, rice, white soya bean, rice flakes, and peanut sweet balls. Followed by discussion with them, the meeting will end with a good lunch.

Targeted Intervention (TI) Programme among Female Sex Workers / MSM/ Transgender / IDU Salem District - April 2023 to March 2024

Background of the Project

PDI had implemented the Targeted Intervention Programme among the Male Sex Workers (MSMs) since July 2004 in Salem District with the support of Tamil Nadu AIDS Initiative (TAI) and Voluntary Health Services (VHS) Chennai. The programme was implemented among 2000 Male Sex Workers in Salem District. The MSMs include Transgender, Kothi, and Double Decker. On 1st July 2012 the project got transitioned to Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society (TANSACS). After transition TANSACS re-allocated the working area of the three TIs implemented by three different organizations at Salem

during September 2012, and PDI started working in 4 blocks, namely, Ayothyapattinam, Kadaiyampatty, Panaimarathupatti, Yercaud and Corporation of Salem with a population of 453 FSWs, 1371 (MSM-1188, Transgender-183) MSMs/Transgender and 11 IDUs. Since its inception in July 2004, PDI has been at the forefront of combating HIV/AIDS in Salem. Initially supported by TAI and VHS, the program transitioned to TNSACS in 2012, expanding its reach and scope.

PDI's efforts have primarily focused on vulnerable populations, including female sex workers (FSWs), men who have sex with men (MSMs), transgender individuals (TGs), and injecting drug users (IDUs). Through outreach programs, education campaigns, and resource provision, PDI has successfully prevented HIV/AIDS among 1,835 individuals within its target population.

The staff team comprises aProgramme Manager, six Outreach Workers, one M&E cum Accountant and one Counselor. There are 24 trained Peer Educators who do outreach services such as educating their peers on STI/HIV/AIDS, distribute condom and lubricant, and refer their peers to STI Clinics.

Objective

The objectives of the Programme are to

- Bring behaviour change among the sex workers focusing on prevention of STI, HIV/ AIDS through dialogue-based communication
- Empower them to avoid unsafe sexual behavior
- Enhancing health seeking behavior and reduce the burden of STIs among sex workers
- Reduction of issues related to vulnerability
- Promote community collectivization and strengthening

Activities

Behaviour Change Communication

Effective communication is essential for facilitating behavior change, particularly in the context of adopting safer sexual practices. Personalized one-to-one and group interactions can help individuals overcome challenges and establish sustainable routines.

By emphasizing the importance of safe sexual practices, the project aims to reduce the prevalence of Sexually Transmitted Infections and improve overall health outcomes. Moreover, encouraging individuals to advocate for their own needs and access government benefits contributes to a more equitable and supportive society.

Through targeted communication efforts, the project seeks to empower individuals to overcome obstacles, protect themselves, and make informed decisions about their health and well-being.

The project's outreach efforts have been successful, with 1835 individuals reached in April 2023 and 352 new target populations identified during April 2023 to March 2024. The majority of these interactions have occurred through virtual platforms, highlighting the importance of leveraging digital tools for effective communication.

The important activities carried out in behavior change communication are:

- Dialogue-based interpersonal communication through one-to-one and group interaction Peer educator promotion
- Counseling on STI, HIV/AIDS prevention, and other issues.

Peer Educator Review and Induction Training

The project's reliance on peer educators showcases the value of peer-to-peer support and mentorship. By assigning peer educators to directly interact with target populations, the project can leverage their experiences and expertise to inspire and guide positive behavioral changes.

Peer educators play a vital role in disseminating disease prevention information to target populations. The outreach staff also contribute significantly by conducting training sessions and facilitating regular review meetings.

Twenty-two review and planning meetings have been held this year. The team has expanded with the addition of seven new peer educators, who have undergone five induction trainings. Ongoing refresher training programmes is essential to ensure that peer educators remain equipped with the latest knowledge and skills to effectively deliver prevention messages.

Demand Generation Activities

 These group meetings serve as valuable platforms for identifying the specific needs and challenges faced by the target population, thereby enabling the project to be tailored to their unique circumstances.



- These meetings are held once a month in the field, with the active involvement of outreach workers and peer educators. Each meeting typically involves 15 to 20 participants from the target population.
- During the reporting period, a total of 89 group meetings have been held, resulting in the participation of 985 target people.

STI Care Services

Government primary health centers, specifically those with NCD (Non-Communicable Disease) epidemiologic units, offer comprehensive services to address the needs of the target population. These units are equipped to treat Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs), providing prevention education, testing, and treatment for both infected and uninfected individuals. Additionally, they offer cervical cancer screening and treatment services.



Counseling services to encourage regular medical check-ups

The programme actively encourages the target population to seek these services regularly (every three months) through RMC (Regular Medical Check-up). This approach emphasizes preventative measures and disease management through routine checkups. This year, the programme successfully served 352 new individuals, and encouragingly, 1802 out of the existing 1835 target population participated in RMC, demonstrating a strong commitment to their health.

Committee Meetings

The Community Mobilization towards making the programme sustainable is an important activity of the targeted intervention project. The project takes efforts to mobilize the community of core group members to take-up the programme on their own even after the withdrawal of the project activities

- Project Management Committee
- DIC (Drop-in Centre) Management Committee
- Condom Monitoring Committee
- STI Management Committee
- PLHIV Committee
- Welfare Committee

The above-mentioned committees have been formed by involving community as members in the committees. These committees bring the community closer to the programme activities and the project team handheld them to learn the day to day activities of the project team for troubleshooting and to give guidance for effective implementation of the programme activities. Four such meetings were conducted during the reported period

HIV Testing

To ensure comprehensive HIV prevention and early detection, all target individuals within the project, except those already diagnosed with HIV, should undergo regular HIV testing. These tests should be conducted every six months, to monitor HIV status and facilitate timely intervention if necessary.

- During the reporting year, a remarkable 96% of the target population, consisting of 1835 individuals out of 1764, underwent HIV testing. The remaining 4% of the target population, or 71 individuals, were identified as people living with HIV (PLHIV).
- Of those tested, 1514 individuals were tested for HIV twice, demonstrating a strong commitment to regular monitoring. However, 264 individuals only underwent a single HIV test, highlighting the need for continued efforts to encourage consistent testing.
- During the reporting year, 14 individuals were newly identified with HIV and were promptly initiated on antiretroviral therapy (ART) treatment.

Drop-in-Centre (DIC) Meeting

Throughout the reporting year, a total of 43 DIC meetings were held, fostering engagement and participation from 409 target individuals. These monthly meetings serve as valuable platforms for strengthening community bonds, providing access to essential services and support, and facilitating open dialogue and expression among the target population.

Community Event

- A comprehensive Community Event programme was held on September 20, 2023, at the Salem Corporation Kalaignar Hall in Salem Fort. The event featured a distinguished panel of medical professionals, including Dr.S. Ganapathy (Deputy Director, District Tuberculosis Unit Salem), Dr.P. Aravind (Primary Health Center Kannankurichi), Ms. Jegajothi (ICTC Counselor, Kannankurichi), Ms. Kavitha (Counselor, Omalur GH), and Ms. Anitha (Counselor, GMKMCH Salem). The event offered a range of services, including STI/HIV/AIDS and TB screenings, membership drives, and a mobile camp equipped to conduct X-rays for TB detection. A total of 195 individuals from the target population participated and benefited from these valuable services.
- On December 1, 2023, a significant Community Event programme focused on World AIDS
 Day was held at the Salem Municipal Hanging Park Hall. Led by a distinguished panel of
 medical professionals, including Dr. S. Ganapathi, (Deputy Director, District Tuberculosis

Unit Salem) DrSSoundammal, Deputy Director of Health Services, Dr.L. Arunachalam, District Programme Manager, DAPCU, Salem, the event aimed to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS. A poignant candlelight vigil honoring those lost to the disease was attended by over 250 individuals from the target population.

Health Camps

 A medical camp was held on December 6, 2023, at Aringnar Anna Hospital. Dr. P.N. Revathi, MBBS, Medical Officer, presided over the event. Ms. Mahalakshmi, Counselor, and Ms. Hajira, Lab Technician were also present. The camp offered HIV, STI and TB tests. Forty individuals participated.

 Another medical camp was organized on February 23, 2024 at GMKMCH in Salem. The camp targeted a specific population. Mr. Moorthy, Counselor, GMKMCH, Mr. Rajendran, Lab Technician, GMKMCH, and Mrs. Anitha, STD Counselor, Salem participated. Seventy individuals from the target population attended. HIV, RPR, and RMC tests were conducted.

Advocacy Meeting

On August 7, 2023, an advocacy meeting was held at the Salem AravanigalTAI VizhuthagalTrust Office. Representatives from SATVT, SWTVT and SNP attended. The meeting focused on promoting ART (Antiretroviral Therapy) among MSM (Men who have Sex with Men), GFSW (Girls and Women in Sex Work), and other vulnerable populations.

A plan was developed to conduct outreach activities in specific "hotspots" where these individuals frequently congregate. The goal was to engage with them directly and encourage them to seek regular HIV testing and treatment.

Evaluation

An evaluation for the project was conducted from February 12th to 14th, 2024. The evaluation team was led by MrSijothomas and included MrShajith, MrSiva Mahindra Gobi Financial Consultant. DrI.Ambalavanan, Project Director, PDI, Mr. L.Vincent Chander, EC Member, PDI also took part during the evaluation. The evaluation took place at the TI office and involved interviews with project staff and prototype staff.

The team reviewed various aspects of the project, including ART, DAPCU, ICTC, STI Clinic and Stakeholders performance. Field visits were conducted to verify documentation, performance metrics, and account records. The evaluation included interactions with FSWs, MSMs, TGs and IDUs.

- On December 1, 2023, Salem hosted events to commemorate World AIDS Day. Transgender individuals participated in a public awareness campaign on Five Roads, featuring henna drawings and red ribbon installations. Over forty transgender people joined the event.
- Additionally, a World AIDS Day camp was held at the Lorry Market, Lei Bazaar area. IEC distribution and HIV testing was conducted, and public awareness was raised. The event was attended by the stakeholders including Mr.Murthy, Counselor, GMKMCH (Government Mohan Kumaramangalam Medical College Hospital, Salem).

Key activities in community engagement include:

- Facilitating regular meetings for community members to discuss issues, share experiences, and develop collective strategies for advocacy.
- Collaborating with local NGOs/CBOs and government bodies to strengthen support networks and access to resources.
- Organizing events like the World AIDS Day Camp to raise awareness and foster community solidarity.

Conclusion

The Targeted Intervention Programme for Female Sex Workers, MSMs, and Transgender Individuals in Salem District plays a crucial role in addressing the health needs of these vulnerable populations. Through comprehensive outreach, education, and community engagement, the programme aims to reduce the incidence of STIs and HIV/AIDS and empower individuals.

Female Foeticide Prevention Programme (FFPP) – Salem April 2023 to March 2024

Background of the Project

PDI, in collaboration with IMPLICADAS, has been working to address female infanticide and feticide in Salem District since September 2007. Initially focused on four prioritized blocks -Tharamangalam, Omallur, Konganapuram, and Edapadithe-project aimed to eliminate the practice and foster gender sensitivity among parents.

The project's team comprised six field staff and two counselors. Their efforts centered on community

sensitization, ante-natal counseling, and skill development for women. By 2017, the project had concluded its activities in these initial blocks. Recognizing the ongoing prevalence of female feticide in adjacent areas, PDI and IMPLICADAS expanded their intervention to four new blocks: Athur, Vazhapadi, Kadaiyampatty, and Kolathur. This expansion continued from 2018 to 2023.

To further address the issue, the project initiated activities in Nangavalli, Magudanchavadi, Ayothyapattinam, and Gangavalli in early 2024. Prior to this, staff conducted comprehensive assessments, meeting with health officials, administrative departments, community leaders, and frontline workers in these areas to identify the most pressing needs and determine suitable intervention strategies.

Collecting the List of Ante-Natal Mothers

The project has been collecting the list of anti-natal mothers in the selected four blocks. A data base has been created with the information collected and the counselors also meet them regularly till the delivery of the child. In case of female children, they follow the family for eighteen months period even after the delivery. During the reporting period, 2426 ante-natal mothers were enrolled and are under follow up. Out of 2426 ante-natal mothers, 598 were mothers with one or more number of girl children who are considered as mothers at risk by the project. The project team is following the ante-natal mothers of older blocks with the help of volunteers.

Inter-Personal Communication

Field workers actively engaged with ante-natal mothers, educating them about the importance of comprehensive medical care throughout the pre-natal and post-natal periods. The sessions covered nutritional status, hygiene practices, and gender equality, with a particular focus on preventing female feticide. A total of 3,520 interaction sessions were conducted during the reporting period till December 2023.

Counseling Services to the Women at Risk

During the interpersonal communication the field staff would take efforts to identify the women with the problems and refer them for counseling to the counselors. The counselors would provide counseling services to the ante-natal mothers and for their husbands on the identified issues. 517 new counseling and 458 counseling sessions were given to mothers at risk.

Sensitization of General Population through Street plays

The project has formed a Street Play Troupe and they performed plays in the villages on Gender Issues, Importance of Education to Women and against the practice of Female Infanticide. The general population was sensitized on the gender issues. During the reported period Street Plays were performed in 12 villages and nearly 1054 were reached with the messages.

SHGs for Mother at Risk

The project has identified women with girl children and formed 68 Self-Help Groups with the membership of 832 women. The Mothers with Girl Children were given priority while forming the Self-Help Group. Their group savings is Rs.13,93,800/- and during the reported period 2 SHGs have been started.

Family Dialogue Sessions

Many mothers at risk faced significant challenges and felt isolated due to a lack of support. To address these issues, the project conducted family dialogue sessions. These sessions focused on various concerns, including:

- **Preference for Male Children:** Addressing the pressure from husbands and mothers-in-law to have a male child.
- Family Planning Restrictions: Discussing barriers to family planning.
- **Poor Maternal Health:** Addressing health concerns arising from frequent pregnancies.

• **Promoting Paternal Responsibility:** Encouraging husbands to participate in family planning.

In total, the project conducted family dialogue sessions with 148 families, offering support and guidance to these women in distress.

Women Support Centre

In June 2009, the Women Support Center was established to provide assistance to women in crisis. The center comprised an advocate, a feminist journalist, and the project leader of the Female Infanticide Prevention Program. The advocate conducted legal education sessions in villages, focusing on the Domestic Violence Act 2005, women's property inheritance rights, and gender issues. The team successfully addressed three legal cases.

The Women Support Center offered comprehensive legal guidance and counseling to victims, addressing a range of issues including: Domestic Violence by the spouses, Land disputes, guiding them to the government welfare measures and to apply for educationalloan.

Gender Clubs - SAMAM

The adolescent who hails from the target blocks in the age group of thirteen to twenty were trained on life skills and were formed as Gender Clubs. PDI has formed 57 Gender Clubs and these clubs are named as "SAMAM" which means Equal. The objective of forming Gender clubs is that these groups will serve as volunteers in the target area and the Gender Clubs are to raise the awareness level of youths on gender issues and to bring up them as Gender Sensitized Citizens. The project is now using them in preventing the Practice of Female Infanticide in the handed over blocks.

Life Skills Education for Adolescents and Youth

The project implemented a comprehensive life skills education program for adolescents and youth, focusing on ten essential skills including the life skills program focused on empathy, problem-solving, interpersonal relationships, critical thinking, communication, creative thinking, stress management, self-awareness, decision making, and emotion management.

Trained staff conducted these sessions for 667 adolescents (313 boys and 354 girls) aged 13 to 20 from the four target blocks. The

programme incorporated gender-focused discussions to sensitize adolescents on key gender issues. Each session lasted four hours, conducted over two evenings.

Gender Sensitization for Women in SHGs

The project organized gender sensitization programs for women in Self-Help Groups (SHGs) at the village level. These programs extended to SHGs operated by other NGOs, with counselors facilitating the sessions. The counselors educated women about their rights and the importance of achieving gender equality. Staff members received training on conducting these gender sensitization programs. During the reporting period, a total of 553 women from 51 SHGs participated in these beneficial programmes.

Gender Sensitization for Men

The project recognized the crucial role of men in promoting gender equality. Men often perpetuate gender stereotypes and discriminatory norms, limiting women's opportunities throughout their lives. To address this, the project focused on sensitizing men on gender issues and challenging harmful societal norms. The staff team engaged with men in villages, organizing dedicated meetings. Counselors and outreach workers facilitated these sessions, which were attended by 259 men.

International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women Campaign

The project commemorated the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women (November 25 - December 9, 2023) through a comprehensive campaign in multiple villages.

The campaign focused on raising awareness about domestic violence and child marriage in the following villages: Atthanur, Poosaripatti, Masilampalayam, Pungavadiputhur, Tharapuram, Somampatti, Koolamedu, Kangiyanur,

Singipuram, Chithirapattiputhur, Chelliyampalayam, Ammampalayam, Viralikadu, Moolakadu, Pommiyampatti, Thookiyampalayam, Nadupatti, Chinnathiruppathi, Arasanatham, Ramanayakkanpalayam, Iyyamputhur, Denishpet, Semmandapatti, and Muthampatti.

The staff team actively engaged with community members, promoting awareness and facilitating oath-taking ceremonies to pledge commitment to ending domestic violence and child marriage.

On March 8, 2023, the project team organized a commemorative event to markInternational Women's Day in Vazhapadi and Athanurpatti. PDI staff and approximately 100 women from local self-help groups participated in a rally. During the rally, participants raised awareness about women's achievements, the importance of female education and gender equality, and took an oath to combat child marriage, female feticide, and domestic violence.

Targeted Intervention Programme - Thanjavur (April 2023 - March 2024)

Project Overview

People's Development Initiatives (PDI) has been implementing a community-based STI/HIV/AIDS prevention Programme in Thanjavur District since April 2007. Initially supported by Tamil Nadu AIDS Initiatives (TAI), Voluntary Health Services (VHS), Chennai, the project transitioned to government support under the Tamil Nadu AIDS Control Society (TANSAC) in April 2012. The project serves 1,373 high-risk individuals (1193 MSM, 180 TG) in 14 blocks of Thanjavur district. The staff team consists of one Programme Manager, one Monitoring and Evaluation Assistant cum Accountant, one counselor, five Outreach Workers, and twelve Peer Educators from the core group population.

Programme Objectives

- Promote behavior change among MSMs and Transgender individuals, emphasizing disease prevention and quality of life.
- Increase health-seeking behavior among the key population.
- Reduce the burden of sexually transmitted infections.

Key Activities and Achievements STI Services:

Key population is at higher STI risk due to frequent sexual activity. Hence, all the population identified with High-Risk Behaviour still gets tested once in every three months. Project team has good rapport with STI Clinics and refers individuals for early identification and treatment. During this period,

• 64 cases of syphilis were diagnosed and treated. And the number of individuals Regularly Visited for Medical Checkups were as follows.

- 267 individuals (203 MSM, 64 TG) were newly identified with STIs and enrolled in presumptive treatment programmes.
- 1317 individuals (1148 MSM, 169 TG) were referred to ICTC centers for HIV testing, resulting in 13 new HIV diagnoses and enrollments in ART care.

Peer Education

Peer education plays a pivotal role in fostering behavioral change among the core group members through interpersonal communication. In this project, Peer Educators act as change agents within their own peer groups, effectively transforming unsafe behaviors into safer practices. These peer educators are selected by their peers themselves, with guidance from the staff team.

Peer Educators are instrumental in expanding the project's reach and impact. Regular review meetings at the Block-, Drop-in-Center-, and Project-levels are conducted to assess their activities and provide ongoing motivation. The peer educators are well-equipped with microlevel planning skills. These review meetings enable the project team to identify gaps in services, pinpoint risk behaviors, and develop tailored plans for their peers.

- Twelve new peer educators were added to the team, enhancing its capacity to reach more individuals.
- Peer educators actively promoted condom use within their networks and facilitated oneon-one meetings with individuals.
- They regularly informed the target population about the importance of regular medical check-ups and conducted weekly and monthly hotspot visits.
- Additionally, they played a vital role in distributing condoms and lubricant, serving as a constant reminder of the need for medical check-ups.
- Twenty four meetings conducted in TI office.

Advocacy

The secondary target population exerts significant influence on the primary target audience. Their support is crucial for the successful implementation of the Targeted Intervention Programme. By actively involving stakeholders, the project aims to create a more effective and sustainable program. Other stakeholders, including auto-drivers, lodge boys, and retailers,

were also invited to the meeting to familiarize them with the Programme's activities and objectives. These stakeholder meetings provide a clear understanding of the Programme's goals and facilitate the project team in obtaining their support. The project motivates stakeholders to actively participate in programmeactivities by organizing advocacy meetings when

and where necessary. During the reporting period, three such advocacy meetings were held in the target area.

Three advocacy meetings were held to address the needs of the target population and promote their well-being. On August 22, 2023 a meeting was held in Manojpatti to advocate for the target population. Over twenty transgender women participated, chaired by Thanjavur District Nayak R.M.Nalini and K.Saranya Nayak. Key discussions included increasing new registration, continuing medical treatment, and the need for HIV and STI testing. Ms Thenmozhi, Project Manager, PDI also discussed social security welfare schemes, condom jelly, and free self-employment training through IOB Bank.

On September 29, 2023 a meeting was held in Thanjavur under the leadership of Ms. Anurabu Natarajamani, District Social Welfare Officer. Village health officers from all 14 blocks and the outreach team attended. The meeting focused on social protection programmes for transgender individuals, the role of social village welfare officers, and applying for social welfare projects.

On November 30, 2023 a support and presentation meeting was held at the

Thanjavur District Collector's Office, chaired by Ms Anurabu Natarajamani (District Social Welfare Officer), M. Madan, Ms Jenifer Arulmary, District Programme Manager, (DAPCU, Thanjavur), PDI staff, Peer Educators, and Police Inspector Mr Ravimathy. The meeting focused

on transgender welfare, with the police inspector encouraging individuals to avoid trouble, quit harmful practices, and take advantage of available welfare schemes. Identification cards were also scanned at the Social Welfare Office.

Demand Generation Meetings

Demand generation meetings were organized at various hotspots to address the specific needs of the key populations. Peer

Educators, supported by Outreach Workers, facilitated these meetings. Communication materials focusing on STI/HIV awareness, addressing violence, and promoting quality of life were utilized during these meetings. These meetings played a crucial role in encouraging community members to access the project's services consistently. Approximately ten to fifteen individuals attended each hotspot meeting. During this reporting period, 88 Demand Generation Meetings were

held at 20 hotspots (MSM 1210, TG 305)

Social Safety Schemes

The project has significantly improved the lives of transgender individuals by providing them with essential documents, financial security, and opportunities for employment and education.

Key Achievements

- 124 transgender individuals received identity cards.
- 55 obtained medical insurance cards.
- 35 acquired Aadhar cards.
- 5 opened bank accounts.
- 5 secured private job opportunities.
- 30 participated in self-employment training.
- 15 obtained voter ID cards.
- 7 filed income tax returns.
- 22 applied for bank loans.

Community Mobilization

The project is committed to mobilizing the core group population to ensure the sustainability of program activities beyond project withdrawal. To facilitate this, the project organizes community events twice a year, providing a platform for individuals to connect with each other. These events also offer opportunities for participants to showcase their talents through sports and cultural activities. Two community events were held to bring together the target population and celebrate the project's achievements.

A gathering was held at Thendral Wedding Mahal in Kumbakonam, on September 22, 2023. Dr. I. Ambalavanan, Project Director of PDI, presented on the project. Honorable Mayor Dr. K. Saravanan and Dr. M. P. Divyabharathi, STI department, presided over the event. Mr Swaminathan from the Leprosy Unit and Mrs. Pa. Shanthi, Counselor also addressed the participants. Over 100 people attended, enjoying dancing, singing, competitions, and prize distribution by special guests. PDI Officers and peer educators organized the program.

HIV/AIDS. A booklet (IEC) was distributed to the general public, and a signature drive was held. Over 200 members of the general public participated..

Evaluation of Thanjavur Targeted Intervention Programme

The Tamil Nadu AIDS Control Society (TNSACS) conducted a three-day participatory evaluation of projects it supports in Thanjavur. A three-person team, comprising a Lead Evaluator, Co-evaluator, and a financial expert, assessed both the technical and financial aspects of the program.

From October 24th to 26th, the evaluation team, consisting of Mr Sijo Thomas (Lead Evaluator), Mr Shajith (Co-evaluator), and Mr Shivamani (Audit Assistant), visited various locations within Thanjavur, including hotspots, government hospitals, primary health centers, ART centers, ICTCs, STI clinics, and condom retailers. They interacted with staff, peer educators, secondary stakeholders, medical officers, counselors, lab technicians, and community leaders. The team also engaged in in-depth discussions with district officials, such as the District Programme Manager and the District Social Welfare Officer.

Conclusion

The Targeted Intervention Program in Thanjavur has made significant strides in addressing STI/HIV/AIDS among high-risk populations. Through comprehensive services, advocacy efforts, and community engagement, the project has contributed to improved health outcomes and social well-being for MSM and transgender individuals in the region.

Women Empowerment Programme (WEP) in Tiruchirapalli April 2023 to March 2024

PDI, in partnership with IMPLICADAS, Vigo, Spain, has been implementing comprehensive Women Empowerment Initiatives in twenty-three slums of Tiruchirapalli City. This collaborative effort aims to address the unique challenges faced by women in urban areas and promote gender equality through a gender-based development approach.

Key Focus Areas:

- **Economic Empowerment:** Providing vocational training, microfinance, and livelihood support to women.
- Education and Health: Enhancing access to education and healthcare services for women and girls.
- Community Leadership: Developing women's leadership skills and fostering their participation in community decision-making.
- Advocacy and Awareness: Raising awareness about women's rights and addressing gender-based violence.

Key Activities and Achievements

SHG Orientation and Formation:

- **Eight Orientation Programmes:** Conducted in slums like Anthakondan, Jailpet, and Kuppankulam, reaching a total of 96 women.
- **Training Topics:** Covered SHG formation, resolution registers, bank accounts, finance management, and animator roles.
- Six New SHGs: Established in C Block, Chinnasamy Nagar, Jailpet, and Woraiyur, with bank accounts opened at branches of TDCC Bank.
- Current SHGs: A total of 47 active SHGs with 626 members and savings of Rs. 56, 24,700.

SHG Credit Linkage:

- Nine SHGs Linked: Successfully secured credit from TDCC Bank branches in Thennur, Thendral Nagar, and Palakarai.
- **Total Credit:** Secured a total of Rs. 32, 00,000 in credit linkages with banks.

Counseling Services for Women in Need

PDI staff facilitated nine counseling sessions during the reporting period to address domestic issues faced by women in various slums, including Kuppankulam, Periyar Nagar, Ramamurthy Nagar, Sathya Nagar, Jailpet, Chinnasamy Nagar, Chokalingapuram, and Andakondan.

Common concerns raised by the women included:

- **Suspicion of Infidelity:** Women expressed concerns about their husbands' suspected infidelity.
- **Physical Abuse:** Women reported instances of physical abuse, often linked to their husbands' alcohol consumption.

These counseling sessions provided a safe space for women to share their experiences, seek support, and explore potential solutions to their challenges. The counseling services offered by PDI played a crucial role in empowering women to cope with domestic violence and build healthier relationships.

Community Organization Programmes

During the reporting period, students from various colleges including Departments of Social work of Bishop Heber College, Holy Cross College, Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli, Hindu College, Nagercoil, and Alagappa University, Karaikudi were actively engaged in community organization programmes across Tiruchirapalli. These initiatives focused on critical issues such as environmental sanitation, gender sensitization, child safety, and health awareness.

Key Programme Areas:

- **Environmental Sanitation:**Programmes in Jailpettai and Mahalakshmipuram promoted self-hygiene and environmental cleanliness, contributing to a healthier community.
- **Gender Sensitization:** A programme in Jailpettai empowered women by educating them about gender equality and their rights, fostering a more inclusive society.
- **Child Safety:** A programme in Jailpettai taught children vital safety skills, including safe touch and how to interact with others, protecting them from potential harm.
- **Health Awareness:** A programme in Ramamurthy Nagar raised awareness about breast and uterine cancers, encouraging early detection and prevention.

These community-driven initiatives not only addressed pressing social issues but also provided valuable learning experiences for the participating students. By working together with local communities, the students had the opportunities to learn the lives of underprivileged women of slums through their field work exercises.

Recent initiatives in the target slums have sought to promote social justice and equality.

- Legal Awareness: A camp in Ramamurthy Nagar provided essential information about legal rights and protections for all citizens.
- Women's Empowerment: A programme in Mudukkupatti discussed the benefits of forming Self Help Groups (SHGs) as a means for women to achieve financial independence and empowerment.

These programmes collectively contribute to a more inclusive and equitable society.

Community Health Initiatives: Medical Camps

To address the healthcare needs of the community, several medical camps were organized during this period. These camps offered a range of essential services, including general medical check-ups and eye care.

- General Medical Check-ups: Two camps were held in Kavibharathi Nagar and Kanaga School, Chinnasamy Nagar. A total of 145 individuals benefited from these camps, receiving comprehensive medical assessments and consultations.
- **Eye Care Services:** An eye camp was conducted in AndakondanAnkanvadi. This initiative provided eye examinations and treatments to 75 people, helping to improve their vision and overall well-being.

Ms Nithya, District Social Welfare Officer, and Advocate Ms U. Nirmala Rani, President of the Tamil Nadu Women's Legal Forum, graced the inaugural program as chief guests.

Skill Advancement Centre for Women – Karaikal April 2023 to March 2024

Preface

PDI has been a driving force for community development in Karaikal since December 2005, initiating various programs to address the region's needs. Following the 2005 tsunami, PDI implemented a comprehensive rehabilitation program in thirteen villages, supported by Implicadas, Vigo, Spain. To further empower the community, PDI established Skill Training Centers in all thirteen villages, providing women with vocational training. Sewing programs were offered in each village for six months, catering to the needs of illiterate young girls and women. A total of 177 women participated in these sewing classes, and 62 of them successfully started their own home-based sewing businesses using sewing machines purchased under the Income Generation Program.

PDI's Skill Advancement Centre for Women in Karaikal has been instrumental in providing women with essential skills and opportunities. The centre has been supported by various organizations, including ONGC, Cauvery Asset, Karaikal, GH Induction India Pvt. Limited, IVTL Infoview Technologies Pvt Ltd, Vaken Technologies Pvt Ltd, and NOVA (Northern Virginia Thiruppugazh Group).

From April 2023 to March 2024, the centre was managed with funds generously donated through the Benevity Causes portal. This support has enabled the centre to continue providing valuable training and resources to women in the community. This initiative has not only empowered individuals but has also contributed to the overall economic development of the community.

Sewing Training Program

The Skill Advancement Centre for Women successfully conducted two sewing training programs during the reporting period. A total of 48 women participated in these programs, with 27 women completing the first batch and 21 women completing the second batch.

Certificate Distribution:

Two separate certificate distribution ceremonies were held to honor the achievements of the participants:

First Batch: The ceremony took place on July 6, 2023, with Ms Sai Geetharani from the Cooperative Department, Karaikal and Mr Ravishankar, the Women Protection Officer, Karaikal as chief guests.

Second Batch: The ceremony took place on December 27, 2023, with Ms Vandarkuzhali from Avviaiyar Women's Arts College, Karaikal and Mr Ravishankar, the Women Protection Officer, Karaikal presiding over the program.

Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and Federation

During the reporting period, three new self-help groups were established in Vettaikararn Street, Tsunami Nagar, and Kasakudi. Fifteen women from these groups received loan support through the Mother Theresa Women Federation to address their personal needs. Currently, there are 30 self-help groups operational in the area. The federation's current balance stands at Rs. 1, 69,039/-.
